Dear Parents and Carers,

Welcome back to the start of a new and exciting academic year! It has been wonderful to welcome each of our new Reception children and families into the Hadley Wood Community and we look forward to working closely with you across the course of the academic year ahead.

Our value for September is 'Independence' and what a wonderful first value for the new year! In our whole-school assemblies, we have discussed the importance of being both an independent learner and an independent thinker. We explored the importance of using our own moral compass to think independently in order to make the right choices without following what everyone else is doing.

We have also explored the concept of new beginnings at the start of the academic year. The children have moved into a new classroom, with a new class teacher and so have the ability to write their own magnificent story in the year ahead. 

King Class (Year 3) have settled into their new year group well. They are learning to lead by example as good role models to the younger children in the lower school.

The children in **King Class** recently enjoyed the opportunity to take part in a money matters workshop led by the charity 'My Bank' where they discussed where money comes from, the difference between current and saving accounts and different ways we can pay for our purchases. They are very excited for their next session!

Turing Class have settled beautifully into Year 6. They have all been allocated roles and responsibilities around the school and are becoming great role models for the younger years. They are showcasing our value of the month '**Independence'** well.

In their history lessons, they have begun to learn about WW1. We have been impressed by the children's wonderful enthusiasm towards this unit of work. **Turing Class** worked in groups to look at photographic sources of evidence to ascertain information about the war, as well as use these to independently generate their own questions.

In their English lessons, **Turing Class** have begun a poetry unit exploring poetry from The Great War. In class, the children have explored the meaning of the poem 'Dulce Et Decorum Est' by Wilfred Owen. They are now working towards writing their own poem around the theme of war. The children really enjoyed using drama to help them empathise with the soldiers who fought in WW1.

Moore Class (Reception) have visited the media suite this week during their computing lessons. The children have been developing their mouse skills: learning how to hold a mouse properly, how to left and right click, how to roll over the screen, how to double click and how to drag and drop.

Moore Class are enjoying their weekly Bike Time. This activity supports their physical development. During their outdoor sessions, the children have been learning to negotiate space and obstacles safely, with consideration for themselves and others. We have been impressed by the strength, balance and coordination they have

shown so far when riding a bike or scooter.

In their mathematics lessons, **Moore Class** have been on a number hunt in our designated on-site Forest School area this week. The children represented a range of numbers using found objects. They then learned to sort the objects in order of quantity and match them to the correct amount of fingers.

Thunberg Class (Year 4) have settled in well and have already shown great maturity, resilience and independence in their learning. This half term, the children have been lucky enough to enjoy the opportunity to learn to play the clarinet during their music lessons. The children had great fun in their first lesson learning the correct names for each part of the clarinet and how to put the mouth piece together. This was very tricky as the parts are small! To make a sound the children have to pull a silly face - we have nicknamed this 'The Bunny Face'. They are looking forward to showcasing their skills later on in the term at the parent performance.






This half term in their science lessons, **Attenborough Class (Year 1)** have been learning about the five senses. Throughout September, the class explored each of their senses and answered the question **'Which body parts are linked to our five senses?'**

During the unit of work, the children explored the world around them by taking part in a listening walk, taste test and feely feet challenge. The children have informed me the best bit is still to come—they have a mystery smell test still to look forward too!



The children in **Mandela Class** have impressed Mrs Petrie with a great start to Year 5. They have learned all about their namesake 'Nelson Mandela,' gaining insights into his remarkable journey towards independence and equality. Inspired by his life, they have written their own biographies after conducting thorough research.

Furthermore, the students have been educated about the importance of independence in the digital age, with a focus on staying safe on the internet. This knowledge equips them with the skills to navigate the online world responsibly, fostering a sense of independence in their online interactions.



On the sports field, the students have embarked on their journey into the world of netball. They have delved into the basic rules and honed their skills in using various passes and techniques, crucial for both attacking and defending effectively. This newfound proficiency empowers them to play the game with confidence!

In their art classes, **Mandela Class** have enjoyed delving into the world of Ancient Greek pottery, exploring its rich history and intricate designs. This exploration is a precursor to their upcoming project of crafting their own pottery, where they will have the opportunity to express their creativity and artistic independence. I personally, cannot wait to see their finished pieces!



Parks Class (Year 2) have enjoyed their Forest School sessions so far this term. They have enjoyed the opportunity to pick blackberries which they then heated up to create a dye, which they then used to make tie dye bunting to hang in the classroom.

In their English lessons, **Parks Class** worked in small groups to act out a scene from the book. 'I'll Take you to Mrs Cole', in preparation for the setting descriptions they will be writing later in the week.

In their science lessons, Parks Class have been exploring the properties of materials and how they make these materials suitable for making particular things, for example the reasons why glass is a suitable material to make windows.









Inclusion Corner with Mrs Bertram

Each month our Inclusion Corner article will share information and links to inform on Special Educational Needs. At Hadley Wood School we have an open door policy and as well as your child's class teacher our SENDCO, Mrs Bertram is available to talk through any concerns that you have about your child's education and wellbeing. Please notify the school office if you would like to make an appointment and a member of staff will contact you in due course.

Supporting Children's Social and Emotional Development

- How trauma is not the event itself, rather trauma resides in the nervous system.
- Impact of toxic stress on the whole nervous system, brain, spinal cord, nerves and our five senses.
- Attachment: Difficulties trusting others, perspective taking, social isolation, empathy.
- Regulation: Difficulties identifying, regulating and communicating emotional states.
- Dissociation: Impaired memory for events occurring when dysregulated.
- Behaviour: Impulsive, self-destructive, difficulty self-soothing, oppositional, re-enact past traumas.
- Cognition: Difficulties in attention, lack of curiosity, learning difficulties, difficulties processing information.
- Self-Concept: Negative concept of self, high level of shame, poor body image.

We recognise it is important for all practitioners working with children to understand the principles of the impact of trauma on a child's development so practice can be adapted to support building positive and trusting relationships from which the child can progress and thrive.
